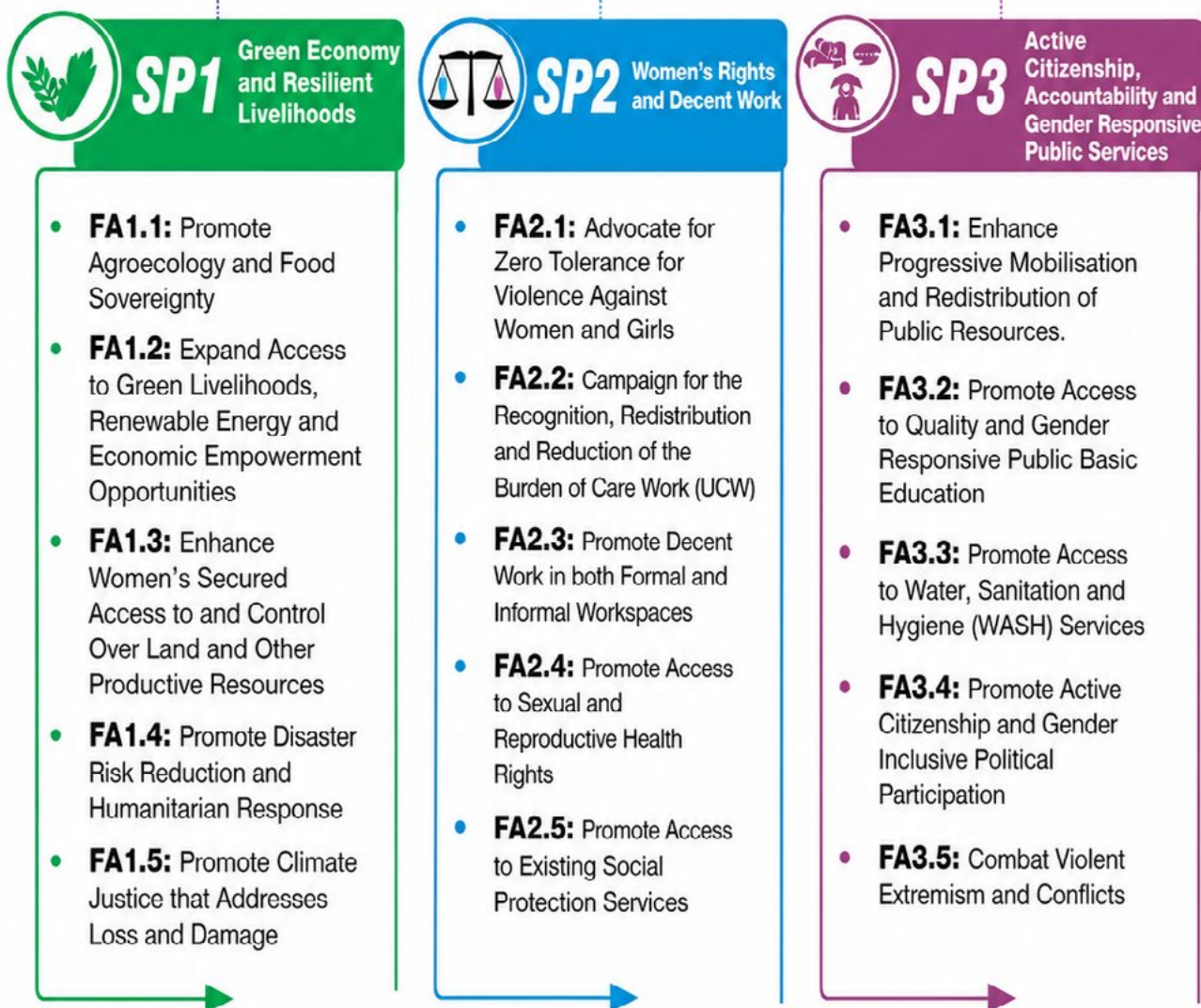

ActionAid Ghana Champions Food Sovereignty through Indigenous seeds development - Green Economy and Resilient Livelihood

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In the first half of 2026, ActionAid Ghana continued to “walk the talk” by demonstrating strong leadership in advancing food sovereignty in Ghana. Guided by a bottom-up approach, ActionAid Ghana, together with movement groups and Smallholder Women Farmers from all target regions, convened over 50 representatives at the first-ever Smallholder Women Farmers’ Conference held in Tamale in the Northern Region.

The conference provided a platform for participants and technical experts to engage in in-depth deliberations on the key challenges affecting their green livelihoods, while collectively identifying practical, community-led solutions. It also served as an important space for knowledge exchange, where findings from ActionAid Ghana’s research, A Gendered Analysis of the Feed Ghana Programme, were presented to

farmers. This strengthened their understanding of sustainable and climate-resilient agricultural practices and facilitated shared learning on how to address emerging challenges in the sector.

We observed with pride the confidence and clarity with which women farmers articulated their lived experiences and perspectives on green livelihoods, an affirmation of the purpose

at the heart of our work with them, and the importance of placing women at the centre of food sovereignty and sustainable development.

Additionally, ActionAid Ghana went a step further, admonishing some of the next steps in the Upper East Region, where we held a capacity building training from young agricultural activists and small holder women farmers in the region on Indigenous Seeds Development.

Promoting Climate Justice and Addressing Loss and Damage

ActionAid Ghana and Foto4Change leads the charge with PhotoExhibition on WaterDay

To mark World Water Day, ActionAid Ghana in collaboration with Foto4Change turned advocacy into experience through a powerful water-themed exhibition that brought the realities of water injustice to the forefront of public consciousness.

The exhibition transformed photography into a tool for storytelling and accountability, capturing the everyday struggles and resilience of communities, especially women and girls, who continue to face unequal access to safe and reliable water. Each image told a story of long journeys to distant water sources, of the disproportionate burden on women's time and energy, and of the urgent need for climate-resilient water systems that uphold dignity and rights.

Far beyond a visual display, the exhibition created a space for reflection, dialogue, and civic engagement. It brought together development practitioners, young people, media, and policy voices to confront the intersecting realities of climate change, inequality, and water insecurity. Through this collaboration, ActionAid Ghana reinforced its commitment to feminist climate justice, centering the voices and lived experiences of those most affected.

IRCC Project Partners and Forestry Commission marks Wetlands Day with Conference and Exhibition

Under **the Improved Resilience of Coastal Communities in Ghana** and Côte d'Ivoire Project, ActionAid Ghana, as a sub-implementing partner, collaborated with the Forestry Commission to commemorate International Wetlands Day in the Anloga District of the Volta Region. The commemoration brought together community members, local authorities, and key stakeholders in a collective effort to raise awareness on environmental protection and the urgent need to safeguard fragile coastal ecosystems.

Activities focused on strengthening community understanding of climate change impacts, particularly coastal erosion, deforestation, and declining livelihoods that continue to affect vulnerable populations in the area.

AAG engages major International Development Organisations on key issues affecting women and girls in Ghana

In the first half of the year, ActionAid Ghana had the privilege of hosting key development partners at its National Office in Accra, strengthening collaboration and advancing shared commitments to sustainable development.

A major highlight was the high-level courtesy and working visit by Zia Choudhury, the United Nations Resident Coordinator in Ghana. The engagement created an important platform for dialogue on strengthening collaboration between the UN system, NGOs, and Civil Society Organisations to advance coordinated, rights-based development approaches in Ghana.

ActionAid Ghana also hosted the Country Director of Compassion Ghana International and the International Team for bilateral discussions focused on deepening partnerships and enhancing collective impact for sustainable development.

IRCC Project holds Baseline Validation Workshop - Stakeholders validate finding on coastal communities struggle in Anloga and Ada District.

ActionAid Ghana, together with government institutions, development partners, and community representatives, held a Baseline Study Validation Workshop for the Improved Resilience of Coastal Communities in Côte d'Ivoire and Ghana Project.

The workshop provided a platform for stakeholders to review and validate key findings that will guide the implementation of the climate resilience project across 11 coastal communities in the Volta and Greater Accra Regions. Funded by the Adaptation Fund and coordinated by UN-Habitat, the project seeks to strengthen community resilience against flooding, coastal erosion, and climate-related livelihood losses.

AAG and Partners Commissions Dams under the EU-Funded Community Actions Plan project



After eleven months of implementation, ActionAid Ghana and funding Partners, GIZ officially handed over irrigation dams for communities in the Upper West Region under the CAPs project.

ActionAid Ghana, together with GIZ and the European Union in Ghana, officially handed over the Buka Dam to the people of Buka in the Wa West District under Resilience Against Climate Change (REACH) Project. The intervention forms part of Community Action Plans.

The intervention forms part of community-led climate resilience infrastructure implemented across communities in the Upper West and Savannah Regions through the Community Action Plans (CAPs) approach. By placing communities at the centre of decision-making, the project has improved access to water, supported year-round farming, strengthened household incomes, and enhanced food security.

The initiative highlights the power of locally driven solutions in building resilience against climate change and advancing sustainable community development.



Advocacy Initiatives: Advancing Coastal Resilience through Community Awareness and Action.

Under the Improved Resilience of Coastal Communities in Ghana and Côte d'Ivoire (IRCC) Project, funded by the Adaptation Fund, ActionAid Ghana together with partners UN-Habitat and Habitat for Humanity, continues to drive advocacy and awareness efforts aimed at strengthening climate resilience among vulnerable coastal communities.

Recognising the growing threats of coastal erosion, flooding, rising sea levels, mangrove degradation, and livelihood losses, the project is prioritising community sensitisation, climate education, and stakeholder engagement to promote sustainable environmental practices and community-led action.

Through targeted engagements across coastal communities, the initiative is fostering inclusive participation and strengthening local ownership of climate solutions tailored to the unique realities of each community. The project also continues to amplify the voices of women, youth, fisherfolk, and other vulnerable groups while promoting collaboration among traditional leaders, civil society, local authorities, and the media.

These advocacy efforts are contributing to the development of informed, empowered, and climate-resilient coastal communities in both Ghana and Côte d'Ivoire.



Promoting Active Citizenship for Social Justice: Active Citizenship, Accountability



As part of efforts to strengthen accountability and advance social justice, ActionAid Ghana engaged members of the AAG Press Corps in Tamale and movement groups including the Young Urban Women's Movement and Activista Ghana, in a capacity-building session on the role of the media and activism in driving social change.

The engagement focused on the effective use of social media tools, digital advocacy, and best media practices to amplify marginalised voices, promote responsible storytelling, and strengthen public engagement on social justice issues. The session also reinforced the importance of collaboration between the media and grassroots movements in promoting transparency, accountability, gender equality, and inclusive development.



Advancing Rights and Combatting Child Labour in Cocoa Value Chains in Ghana (ARCCLG) - Championing Child Rights

ActionAid Ghana, in collaboration with ActionAid UK, officially launched the “Advancing Rights and Combatting Child Labour in Cocoa Value Chains in Ghana (ARCCLG)” project in Goaso, Bono Region bringing together key stakeholders committed to protecting children and strengthening Ghana’s cocoa sector.

The launch convened representatives from DOVVSU, Social Welfare, the Department of Cocoa Cooperatives, CHRAJ, the Department of Gender, Cocoa Women Farmers Associations, civil society

organisations, traditional leaders, and other partners; creating a dialogue on the realities of child labour and the practical steps needed to address it within cocoa-growing communities.

Funded by the The Chartered Institute of Procurement & Supply Foundation and the Postcode Lottery, the one-year project will be implemented across four districts in the Bono and Ahafo Regions. At its heart is a clear goal, to contribute to a 20% reduction in child labour by strengthening community-based child protection systems and promoting awareness and implementation of the National Action Plan on Business and Human Rights (NAP-BHR).



ActionAid Ghana and Activista Get Results; Court Rules 15-Year Sentence for Defilement Case



ActionAid Ghana and its youth movement, Activista Ghana, recorded a significant victory in the fight against sexual and gender-based violence following the conviction and sentencing of a 48-year-old man for defiling a 14-year-old girl.

The Tamale High Court presided over by His Lordship Justice Charles Kwesi Acheampong, sentenced Abdallah Mohammed to 15 years imprisonment with

hard labour after finding him guilty of defilement. The court also imposed an additional six-month prison sentence for perjury after establishing that the convict had provided false testimony under oath during the trial.

The judgment marked the culmination of sustained advocacy, legal support, and community engagement efforts led by ActionAid Ghana and Activista Ghana to promote the protection of women and girls and ensure access to justice for survivors of abuse.

A key issue during the proceedings was the age of the survivor. While the accused maintained that the victim was 18 years old, the prosecution argued that she was 14 years old at the time of the offence. After reviewing testimonies from the survivor and her guardian, as well as evidence from previous court proceedings, the court determined that the prosecution had proven beyond reasonable doubt that the victim was a child when the offence occurred.

ActionAid Ghana Mobilises Communities Through Radio to Tackle Substance Abuse and School Dropout in Upper West Region

As substance abuse and illegal mining (galamsey) continue to threaten the health, education, and future of young people, ActionAid Ghana is strengthening community awareness and promoting collective action to address these growing challenges.

In the month of June, the Upper West Regional Programme of ActionAid Ghana, in partnership with ACTIVISTA – Upper West Regional Chapter, hosted a coordinated radio sensitisation campaign across six districts in the Upper West Region under the theme: “The Impact of Substance Abuse and Galamsey on Youth Health and School Dropout in the Upper West Region.”

The two-hour interactive discussions brought together representatives from the Ghana Health Service (GHS), Ghana Education Service (GES), National Youth

Authority (NYA), and ACTIVISTA, who examined the rising prevalence of substance abuse and illegal mining among young people and their far-reaching consequences for health, education, and community development.

The conversations highlighted how substance abuse and the lure of galamsey are exposing many young people to serious health risks, disrupting their education, and increasing school dropout rates, ultimately limiting their opportunities and undermining sustainable development in the region.

Beyond raising awareness, the radio programme served as a platform for public dialogue, encouraging listeners to reflect on the root causes of these challenges and the shared responsibility required to address them. Panellists called for

stronger collaboration among families, schools, traditional leaders, government institutions, civil society organisations, and young people to create safer environments, strengthen prevention efforts, and support vulnerable youth.

Through this initiative, ActionAid Ghana reaffirmed its commitment to empowering young people with information, amplifying community voices, and fostering partnerships that protect children's and youth's rights to quality education, good health, and a future free from the harmful effects of substance abuse and illegal mining.





ARCCLG

AAG STRENGTHENS COMMUNITY ACTION FOR CHILD PROTECTION IN COCOA-GROWING COMMUNITIES IN THE BONO REGION.

The Advancing Rights and Combating Child Labour in Cocoa Value Chains (ARCCLG) Project took a significant step towards enhancing child protection in its operational communities by strengthening the capacity of Community Based Anti-Violence Teams (COMBATs).

As part of the initiative, 80 COMBAT members from 16 project communities across the Bono and Ahafo Regions received training to equip them with the knowledge and skills needed to serve as community watchdogs on child rights and child protection issues.

Each participating community selected five representatives from diverse stakeholder groups, including traditional leaders, Assembly

Members or Unit Committee Members, women, youth, and school representatives. This inclusive approach was adopted to promote collective responsibility for child protection and ensure that all segments of the community played an active role in safeguarding children.

The training enhanced participants' understanding of child rights, child protection mechanisms, and the prevention and reporting of child labour and other forms of abuse. It also strengthened the capacity of community members to identify risks, respond appropriately to protection concerns, and work collaboratively with relevant institutions to support vulnerable children.





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ActionAid Ghana Partners GBC as Headline Sponsor of Women Voices to Advance Women's Rights and Gender Equality

In a significant move to strengthen national conversations on gender equality and women's empowerment, ActionAid Ghana has been unveiled as the official headline sponsor of the Ghana Broadcasting Corporation's (GBC) flagship programme, Women Voices.

The partnership brings together Ghana's leading social justice organisation and the nation's public broadcaster to create a powerful platform that elevates the voices of women and girls, drives public

discourse on gender issues, and champions solutions that advance women's rights and social inclusion.

At a time when women and girls continue to face barriers to economic opportunities, leadership, education, safety, and equal participation in society, the partnership seeks to ensure that their experiences and perspectives are not only heard but also influence policy and development outcomes.

For ActionAid Ghana, the collaboration is a strategic investment in amplifying issues that matter most to women and girls, particularly those from marginalized communities whose voices are often excluded from mainstream discussions.



Thought Leadership Conversation: Development Experts Lead Dialogue on IMF's Impact on Social Development

In the first half of 2026, ActionAid Ghana continued to strengthen its thought leadership and media advocacy efforts by driving critical social justice conversations within mainstream media and national policy spaces.

Through strategic media engagements, public advocacy, and policy dialogue platforms, ActionAid Ghana successfully positioned key issues affecting women, young people, and vulnerable communities at the centre of national discussions. Notable among these was the organisation's strong advocacy for justice in the Tamale defilement case, which gained significant national attention through mainstream media engagements, including discussions on Citi FM's Morning Show and sustained public advocacy demanding accountability and justice.

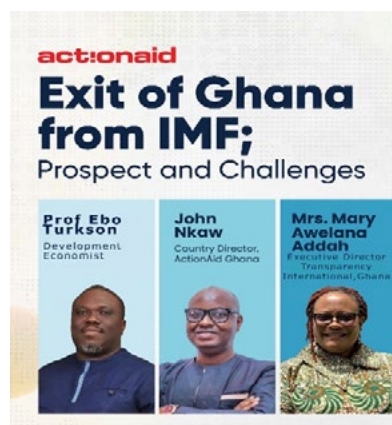
ActionAid Ghana also engaged relevant state institutions, including petitioning the Attorney General on the matter, while consistently amplifying calls for

stronger protection systems for women and girls. In addition, the organisation welcomed and publicly supported government efforts to address sexual exploitation and abuse, including actions against sex-for-jobs practices.

On economic justice, ActionAid Ghana convened and participated in high-level discussions on Ghana's exit from the IMF programme, using mainstream media and public dialogue platforms to advocate for people-centred economic policies, stronger social protection systems, accountability, and inclusive development.

Across television, radio, digital platforms, and community media, ActionAid Ghana continued to shape public discourse on gender justice, climate resilience, decent work, economic justice, and civic accountability, reinforcing its role as a leading voice for rights-based advocacy and transformative social change in Ghana.

Additionally, AAG movement groups championed various advocacy actions using digital spaces to seek justice for the vulnerable in society. In this half, ActionAid Ghana movement, Young Urban Women's Movement paid a courtesy call on the Minister for Labour and Employment seeking updates on ILO C190 ratification.

ILO C190 - Young Urban Women's Movement Group Meets with Labour Minister on Progress.

As part of our May Day activities, the Young Urban Women's Movement paid a courtesy visit to the Minister for Labor, Jobs and Employment, Hon. Dr. Abdul -Rashid Hassan Pelpuo, on 29th April 2026 to engage on the status and progress of Ghana's ratification of the International Labour Organization (ILO) Convention 190.

The discussion highlighted the urgent need to promote safe, inclusive, and violence-free workplaces, particularly for women and young people.

The engagement also underscored the importance of fast-tracking the ratification of ILO Convention 190 to strengthen protections against violence and harassment in the world of work.





AAG AMPLIFIES CHILDREN'S VOICES NATIONWIDE TO ADVANCE WASH RIGHTS DURING THE INTERNATIONAL DAY OF THE AFRICAN CHILD (IDAC)

Across Ghana, ActionAid Ghana joined the Department of Children, Metropolitan, Municipal and District Assemblies, traditional authorities, schools, and other stakeholders to commemorate the 2026 International Day of the African Child (IDAC) under the African Union theme: “Ensuring Universal Access to Water, Sanitation and Hygiene for Every Child in Africa.”

The nationwide commemorations reaffirmed ActionAid Ghana’s commitment to protecting and advancing children’s rights by creating platforms where children could directly engage duty bearers and advocate for solutions to the challenges affecting their lives.

From Sunyani to Bolgatanga and Tamale, children emerged as powerful advocates, using speeches, drama, petitions, and dialogue to call for improved access to safe water, sanitation, hygiene, and secure learning environments.

In Sunyani West Municipality, Girls’ Prefects representing seven Junior High Schools passionately appealed to the Municipal Assembly to invest in improved and gender-responsive WASH facilities, including changing rooms for girls in schools. Their advocacy highlighted the urgent need for safe, accessible, and inclusive sanitation infrastructure that supports girls’ education, dignity, health, and menstrual hygiene management.

Participants also learned about ActionAid Ghana's child-friendly school infrastructure model, which integrates mechanised boreholes, handwashing stations, and improved sanitation facilities to create healthier and more inclusive learning environments. These interventions continue to improve school attendance, promote hygiene, and reduce barriers that disproportionately affect girls.

In the Upper East Region, ActionAid Ghana joined the Department of Children and other partners to reinforce the message that access to clean water, sanitation, and hygiene is a fundamental child right. The event celebrated children's active participation while highlighting the organisation's longstanding investments in girl-friendly washrooms, potable water systems, hygiene education, and safe school environments that have enhanced children's health, well-being, and educational outcomes.

Meanwhile, in Sagnarigu Municipality, girls from Sagnarigu Girls' Model Junior High School demonstrated the transformative power of storytelling through drama, bringing to life the daily realities of inadequate water supply, poor sanitation, waste management challenges, and school safety concerns. Their powerful performances culminated in the presentation of a petition to the Municipal Chief Executive, Hon. Abdulai Imoro Gong,

calling for access to clean water, improved sanitation facilities, better waste management, and the completion of the school's perimeter wall.

The engagement yielded tangible commitments from the Municipal Chief Executive, including the drilling of a mechanised borehole by September 2026, support for completing the school's perimeter wall, and the provision of five dustbins to improve waste management—demonstrating the impact of meaningful child participation and accountable governance.

The commemorations underscored a common message across all regions: when children are given safe and inclusive spaces to express themselves, they become effective agents of change capable of influencing policies and decisions that shape their futures.

For ActionAid Ghana, the 2026 International Day of the African Child was more than a commemorative event—it was a reaffirmation that children's voices matter and must remain at the centre of development, governance, and public investment. As the organisation continues to champion child rights, it remains committed to working with government, communities, and partners to ensure that every child has access to safe water, quality sanitation, hygiene services, and dignified learning environments.
