rights to education for all especially girls, ii) ensure participation in the photo action. We managed to get a lot of pictures for the # taxpaysfor ... campaign.



They wanted support on their campaign and Denis, AA Malawi partner, Teachers unions of Malawi spoke in support of the campaign linking it to AA Tax justice campaign on getting corporates pay their fair share of taxes.

While we were busy at the stand, Amade and Andrew participated in the Kilimanjaro Initiative session with Amade as panelist, the Philanthrocapitalism in Education organized by Education international and finally to the convergence meeting of the education zone where participants raised the issues that they would like to see in the thematic declaration of the education zone.

At the end of the day the team also participated

in the key note conference on Education for All: From Dreams to reality. This was a good ending of the day with powerful speakers on quality public inclusive education for all.
