In our class of nearly 90 students half of them were girls but hardly 5 of them managed to go all the way to attain a University education. To date millions of girls in developing countries continue to be out of school because their parents are not able to pay for school fees and their government are not able to mobilize domestic resources to fund for quality education of their children. We must all strive and work hard to make sure that our governments honour

their commitment on the SGDs and especially goal number four on quality public inclusive education.
